FXB India Suraksha (FXBIS) is an Indian non-governmental, non-profit organization providing development assistance to marginalized children, women and communities in rural and urban India. FXBIS was registered in 2007 as a Section 8 company under the Companies Act 2013, with an objective of assisting people to lead a life of dignity by creating a safe, healthy and productive environment. Today, FXBIS with its annual revenue of close to 50 million INR works in different pockets across 329 villages and 5 slums of 12 states and 1 union territory, and has reached out to close to 500,000 people through its community-based programmes and interventions.




#### **PROTECTION AND SAFETY**

# ACHIEVEMENTS & NEW COLLABORATIONS

- FXBIS impacted a total of **93,625 lives during 2018-19** through its programmes running in **14** locations across 9 states and 1 UT of India. The programmes centered around the organisation's four core domains of Livelihood, Health, Education and Protection & Safety.
- After witnessing the successful manning of Childline 1098 in Gautam Budh Nagar district of Uttar Pradesh, FXBIS was entrusted with the task of establishing **Childline service in Ukhrul district** of Manipur. Both helpline services are functional 24/7, seven days a week, and is supported by Ministry of Women & Child Development under the ICPS scheme.
- In a joint operation with Manipur Police, the state's Anti-Human Trafficking Unit and Social Welfare Department, FXBIS, in collaboration with Manipur Police, social welfare department, Ujjwala homes and Childline rescued and repatriated **179 victims** of trafficking in February 2019. The victims were repatriated to their home country, Nepal.
- FXBIS **collaborated with "Level-Up Education"** (UK based NGO) to bring STEM learning to the under-privileged students from Jaipur and Visakhapatnam slums through online learning. Over 130 children benefitted through this knowledge exchange programme.
- FXBIS **launched the 'Life Skills Education' programme** at all its project locations in its endeavor to make education an all-inclusive rounded package for the adolescents and children we work with be it government schools, FXBIS' Suraksha Education Centres or the rural/ urban slum community youth clubs. Within the inception year, 1259 children and adolescents combined were trained in the 10 essential life-skills recognized worldwide and listed by the UN.
- FXBIS' **collaboration with Mobile Creches (NGO)** has led to the establishment of two day-care centres for children of daily wage labourers, working at the construction sites in Greater NOIDA. The centres provide a safe space to the children along with meals and primary education facilities.

#### FULL STOMACH FULL HEART

Apart from skill, knowledge and other forms of empowerment, FXBIS acknowledges lack of basic needs in the lives of several children of our country. Making the struggle of dignified survival their own, our teams have in participation with the communities, implemented livelihood projects specific to the communities' needs and capacity to carry on much after FXBIS' exit. In this way, we have touched around **4263 lives** (2687 males and 1576 females)



#### BUILDING INFRASTRUCTURE

In our pursuit of trying to give the people we connect with a "good today" and a secure future, FXBIS also endeavours to provide tangible assets. 96 pisciculture ponds, 120 poultry farms, 34 goat sheds, 40 pig pens and 27 dairy farms were built as livelihood assets for communities we work in the NE. As a result, over **3200 family members** were ensured sustainable means of livelihood in 2018-19, and the endeavours continue.



#### SELF-HELP

One of the best indicators of empowerment is self-reliance. We take pride in the success of our efforts in this process. More than a thousand, **1435** women were reached and impacted through various processes of self-help groups, especially in acquainting them with 'Panchasutra' and training them in its five tenets - regular meetings, savings, internal lending, book keeping and repayment of loans. Over **120** SHGs were revived and handheld this way during 2018-19.











### FACILITATING LOW-COST, HIGH YIELD RICE CULTIVATION IN RURAL ASSAM

The 'System of Rice Intensification' (SRI) is a method aimed at increasing rice yield in farming. It is advantageous to paddy farmers because the cost of cultivation is low and the yield is very high. It is also an eco-friendly technique of cultivation where organic compost is used, making the land in use sustainable. FXBIS had begun this initiative in the three remote villages of district Kamrup with exclusively small & marginal farmers. The area covered was 126 bighas (approx.31.5 acres). 65 farmers had participated in the first phase of SRI cultivation. The initiative's first yield had recorded a result growth of above 30% over the average productivity. Some 'food for thought'!

#### **FXBIS PROMOTES WEAVERS' LIVELIHOODS**

Under the CSR initiative of HDFC Bank, FXBIS assisted the traditional weavers to modernise their craft by renovating the size and strength of weaving looms, introducing new tools & techniques and providing training to work on them. This enabled the rural folk to do away with the excruciatingly time-consuming and consequently less remunerative livelihood practice, while preserving the craftsmanship of hand woven products. Weavers of women SHGs of two villages were supported through this intervention.

# IMPROVED HEALTH STATUS

#### **HEALTH FOR ALL**

A practice of organizing regular health camps has been adopted by FXBIS across states of the country. In this year of operation, a total of **2461** adults and children were benefited by such health camps organised by FXBIS at various locations. Besides, 265 toilets' construction was facilitated in the NE and Southern intervention areas of FXBIS.



#### BETTER NUTRITION

Healthcare is complete when both preventive and curative measures are taken in partnership. Nutrition is one aspect that is both preventive and curative in nature in terms of general healthcare. This year, a total of **1331** adults and children were provided with dry nutrition, among who, over 300 people belonged to 'People Living with HIV' (PLHIV) familes.



#### WHY NUTRITION MATTERS

Awareness and sensitization toward any intervention is essential to both gain acceptance and sustain its impact among target groups. Thus, while FXBIS provide people and children with solid nutrition, they also do not neglect the need to educate them about why nutrition is important and how measures can be taken to maintain a nutritious lifestyle. Around **643** individuals participated in **nutrition session(s)** organised FXBIS.



#### TAKING THE OCCASION

While regular awareness sessions and efforts are a practice in our operations, observing occasions is also one of the major opportunities we proudly take to spread knowledge about the matters and concerns we work for. As many as **351** individuals were directly impacted by events and sessions organised by FXBIS on occasions such as World AIDS Day, World AIDS Orphans Day, Global Hand-washing Day and World Toilet Day.

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## CONVERGENCE IN HEALTH DOMAIN: SCRIPTING 'SHARED NARRATIVES'

Development is no one NGO's prerogative or obligation. It is in the shared narratives that hope for India lies. While directly implementing programmes on health at grassroots, FXBIS also attempts at joining heads and hands of like-minded agencies of the government, business houses, even armed forces, to work together for a healthier happier India. Seen are the photos from intervention fields in Manipur, Assam, Uttar Pradesh and Jharkhand, wherein the Army, HDFC, Max India Foundation and Arghyam have gladly collaborated - building together, what is popularly called, the "shared narratives of development".

# ACCESS TO QUALITY EDUCATION

#### **EDUCATION OF ALL FORMS**

**523** children were enrolled to government schools through the 28 Suraksha Education Centres at various locations, **262** children were benefited from Non-Formal Education (NFE) classes, **565** children were benefited from tuition classes, 52 children were benefited from life skill classes among several other interventions. Approximately, **1402** children were impacted, 775 children were benefited by sports clubs and related events and so on. 775 children were benefited by sports clubs and related events and so on.



#### TOOLS OF EDUCATION

Apart from an opportunity, equal accessibility to all is one of the major elements that influence success of any endeavor toward empowerment. While FXBIS teams work toward providing the platform for quality education, they also work toward enabling the students in absorbing the most of the opportunity. For this purpose, school/education material was supplied to **more than 3500** children.



#### WHERE LIFE IS SKILL

FXBIS believes that life is all about the skills one is able to acquire and adopt. More than 1000 children, to be exact **1249** (74 male and 1175 female) were trained in different life skills to enable them to tackle various life situations with ease and efficiency. The power of skill is one of the most superior forms of empowerment.



#### REACHING OUT

Monitoring and assessment is as important as the actual intervention. With a strong belief in this, FXBIS has made regular assessments an integral component of its education domain. Through assessment visits targeted at children and their progress at schools, **631 children** (279 males and 352 females) were assessed and **486** were taken under the ambit through school health cell activities, where students were found lacking in academics due to poor health.











#### ASSISTING SLOW LEARNERS AND SCHOOL DROP-OUTS

FXBIS runs 28 Suraksha Education Centres pan-India for marginalised children with poor academic competence and also for the school drop-outs. Each Centre admits not more than 30 children to ensure individual attention. The teachings are through NFE classes with regular assessments and interactions with parents as well as the teachers (for school going kids). Each Centre also runs a small library, which is instrumental in nurturing reading habit among the children. [In pic: 1 of the 3 SECs at Darrang, Assam]

#### THE SCHOOL UP-LIFTMENT PROGRAMME, PUDUCHERRY

At one of our intervention locations, Puducherry, FXBIS, through its corporate partner Whirlpool India Ltd., has revived a 55 year old school completely. The school had lacked basic amenities such as hygienic toilets and urinals, adequate classrooms. The rural school ground was in a low lying area where stagnant rainwater caused waterborne diseases (dengue, malaria, typhoid) thus increasing absenteeism among students. This government school catering to 864 students has undergone a 180 degree change - Installing glass boards, pin boards to present and project exercises, developing reading corners, closed wall cupboards, murals, painting of school building, a proper kitchen, staff rooms, repairing of electrical items like ceiling fans and tube light for proper lighting and aeration for each classroom, RO water system and separate restrooms for boys and girls. A kids play zone was also developed. Improving the infrastructure has resulted in a rise in school attendance. This renovation has taken a whole year and in appreciation, the State's Honorable Chief Minister chose to inaugurate the 'rejuvenated' school.

#### SENSITIZATION

FXBIS have successfully sensitized more than 1000 children and adolescents in matters of human trafficking. We, at FXBIS, believe the first step to empowerment is knowledge and this knowledge is conveyed through this process of sensitization.



#### THE THREE R'S

FXBIS teams touched lives of several children, adolescents and women victims of trafficking through its various operations. 121 children/adolescents were rescued, 180 rehabilitated and 180 reintegrated throughout the year. In this fight against human trafficking, 481 lives were saved. A total of 764 distress calls related to children were handled through Childline Emergency servivces during the year.



#### AWARENESS

The ones who propagate the values in the society need be reached out to too, so that awareness and sensitivity in the flow of knowledge and beliefs must be maintained. Working on these lines, through awareness processes (for example sessions, rallies, etc), FXBIS impacted 61 religious leaders, 78 taxi drivers and over 60 journalists, by sensitizing them against human trafficking & child sexual abuse, making them aware of its modus operandi and impact.



### LEGAL AID & ENGAGING STAKEHOLDERS

Many survivors choose to restore their lives first, others choose to fight. While we stand with the ones who need our assistance, we fight with the ones who choose to take back their dignity. Team FXBIS provided 140 such fighters with legal aid to fight against the evil of the society to restore what's theirs. Over 4500 related stakeholders were engaged through workshops to build a conducive environment for survivors .











# CONNECTING WITH STAKEHOLDERS: MANIPUR TAXI UNION JOIN THE FIGHT AGAINST HUMAN TRAFFICKING

For the first time in the history of Ukhrul District in Manipur 70 representatives from the 500 member Taxi Union met to show solidarity and join the movement to prevent human trafficking and child sexual abuse in their district. They unanimously decided to include a 18th point in their Union Charter proclaiming that they will act as early warning system and will work closely with police to report any suspicious movement. All 500 taxi drivers will sign this charter which is the guiding principle of the taxi union. FXB India Suraksha has started to work closely with the Union to orient them on different aspects and modus operandi of human trafficking and will assist them in implementing their action plan. Mukti programme supported by ECPAT Luxembourg is on its way to become a people's movement in Ukhrul.

#### "CHILDREN'S MANIFESTO" OF JAIPUR DIVISION

140 children and 60 representatives from various organizations, Child Welfare Committees, government schools, shelter homes from the districts of Jaipur rural, Jaipur urban, Bassi, Sikar, Dossa and Jhunjhunu came together on a common platform - FXBIS in association with UNICEF and RIHR, Jaipur organized a two-day regional level workshop on 'DASHAM- Participation of Children in Democracy'. The young minds came up with a "charter of demands" to be heard upon and addressed by different political parties in their respective manifestos and present it during the Vidhan Sabha elections scheduled for 2018.

# ROUND TABLE DISCUSSION

### CHALLENGES AND WAY FORWARD IN COMBATTING HUMAN TRAFFICKING AND FORCED LABOUR IN INDIA

Trafficking of children and women for forced labour and commercial exploitation constitutes a gross violation of human rights under international law, and violates Indian laws prohibiting child labour and sexual exploitation. India accounts for a significant number of the world's trafficked children and has been designated as Tier 2 in the 2017 'Trafficking in Persons' Report published by the U.S. Department of State. Recognising the current national crisis, a two-day round table discussion in **combatting human trafficking and forced labour** was organized by FXBIS in collaboration with ARZ - "Anyay Rahit Zindagi', with support from the British High Commission, New Delhi, at India International Centre, Delhi on **15th-16th January 2019. 60 participants** representing the **Labour Department, Police Department, Human Rights Commission, Resource Centers, Protection of Child Rights Commission, embassies, INGOS, NGOs, business houses both in the state as well as national level deliberated for two days on the issue.** 

The agenda for the round table discussion was organized in such a way that experts from the relevant field could share their experience and insights in strengthening the existing system leading to conversation on the way forward in dealing on the issue. The **first day** of the discussion focused on discussing the recent trends and challenges experienced by the practitioners from the field addressing human trafficking. The **second day** focussed on highlighting some of the best practices that have worked and could be replicated along with the challenges faced at different stages of addressing the issue of modern-day slavery (prevention, protection, prosecution, repatriation & reintegration).



**Round Table Discussion:** 

Challenges and Way Forward in Combatting Human Trafficking and Forced Labour

HIGHLIGHTED TRENDS AND CHALLENGES: Among the most disturbing trends noted was of the victim seen as a 'problem' by the police. Due to their demotivated spirits and the complications of intersecting laws, they shy away from helping or protecting the victim. The age-old practice of 'Devdasi' which was considered abolished is much prevalent in current times even after the enactment of POCSO Act in 2012. Reverse trafficking is taking place in Bihar. Children as domestic workers are being treated more as bonded helpers than bonafide workers, who are entitled to the minimum wages. Another new trend is for single women parents to be compelled into commercial sexual work. In the socio-economic arena, institutions do not encourage enrolment of kids who come from red light area. In today's digital age, more than 10,000 websites, which openly indulge in human trafficking directly or indirectly, are in operation. Absence of enough resources allocated to SCPCRs (State Commissions for Protection of Child Rights) in North Eastern regions, which are often the source states of trafficking is a big challenge. The legal provisions are currently inadequate to address the issues of online human trafficking. Victim-centric approach in police action is missing. Longer and time-consuming procedures in repatriating victims back to their native countries. There is an urgent need to sensitize the embassy officials across nations since some were reported to be lackadaisical in their approach.

**RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE DISCUSSION:** Recommendations included points pertaining to policy & advocacy, data, research & documentations, replication of best practices and enabling platforms. **Some of the specific recommendations** include **need for review of current laws** and especially those in the draft stage and active advocacy to include some of the major discussions and recommendations emerging from this consultation, **need for standardization of data** also sourcing of reliable data from agencies other than the government, **the airport surveillance systems in Imphal** could be replicated across airports in the country case, **engaging the village headmen** at places where customary laws are very rigid to influence transformation and behavior change; also, to bring in awareness, crucial to **involve local opinion influencers and local institutions** (churches etc.), to bring awareness directly to the community - the **stake-holders should be engaged** as direct actors to bring awareness to the community, **knowledge building on ICT** among the stakeholders such as the NGOs themselves, use of technology in collecting data on child labour, **collaboration** - not only with different government departments and NGOs - but also with other stakeholders such as journalists.
